

Minutes of the Vermilion City Council Public Hearing & Regular Meeting

Monday, November 20, 2017

CALL TO ORDER:

Steve Herron, Council President called the Monday, November 20, 2017, Vermilion City Council Public Hearing to order.

Third Reading – Ordinance 2017-50: AN ORDINANCE VACATING ALL OR PARTS OF FREDERICK AVENUE, EDWARD DRIVE, GARDINER DRIVE, GILBERT DRIVE, CHARLES DRIVE, MIDWAY DRIVE, WILLIAM DRIVE, AND EDGEWOOD DRIVE IN VERMILION RIVER PARK ALLOTMENT NOS. 1 AND 2, AS THE SAME HAS BEEN FAVORABLY RECOMMENDED BY THE VERMILION MUNICIPAL PLANNING COMMISSION.

City Engineer, Lynn Miggins explained that these streets are commonly known as paper streets that were platted around 1929. It was meant to be a large subdivision; parts of it were built and other parts were not. The purpose of this ordinance is to vacate all the streets that were never built and all of the properties along the streets are owned by a single property owner. When streets are vacated the land will revert to that single property owner.

B. Brady asked what the intent of the property is by vacating these streets. James Martynowski representing Vermilion Park Estates said they own about 270 lots and showed the audience members a map of the streets that are being vacated. He said Vermilion Park Estates owns on both sides of those streets. He said they don't own on both sides of Gilbert so they can't vacate the street. Also, on for a reading tonight is a consolidation plat where they are consolidating all the lots into one main piece and a couple small pieces once the street vacation is completed. S. Herron pointed out the consolidation plat is addressed in Ordinance 2017-54 which is on the agenda. J. Martynowski said the sale of the property is under contract with the Lorain County Metro Parks. J. Forthofer asked if he was aware of the intentions Lorain County Metro Parks has for the property. J. Martynowski said he wasn't sure but believed it was for land conservation. He said ten or more years ago, Forest City was going to make larger lots and try to develop the land but it never happened. B. Brady asked if the property will have access frontage. J. Martynowski said the property is still adjacent to right of ways that are being vacated. The properties they are buying do have some access points out to some existing roads. F. Loucka clarified there has never been improvements to the property (water/sewer). B. Holmes clarified the metro parks is only purchasing the land by Forest City. He said there are some lots that are privately owned. J. Martynowski said everything they are consolidating would be their lots. There are lots around the unimproved streets that they don't own, so they couldn't vacate the streets in front of that. He said for example they couldn't vacate Lewis Drive because they don't own some of those lots. He explained when streets are vacated the city is required to notify the property owners within 300 feet of the property of the public hearing.

S. Herron said if this ordinance is adopted by city council, then whoever owns a parcel there will be no effect on their property because they are not vacating their street or doing anything to their property. They are vacating streets that essentially do not exist, but one time by law they were platted. In order to change that, city council has to take action to reverse that decision that was made back in the 1920s. He is getting the impression that there is a concern that the city is doing some type of land use on the personal property, but the city is not doing that.

Jim Walther said he owns four parcels on Gardiner Drive and sees it isn't being vacated in front of his property but wondered how somebody would go about looking at this ordinance and knowing which streets are being vacated in front of their house without more detail being in the ordinance. G. Fisher noted the agenda only shows the caption of the ordinance, but there is an ordinance in full context.

Scott Marks of 4420 Howard Drive asked why they can't purchase the property behind their property since they own right up to it. It was never offered to them. L. Miggins said the streets are split down the

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center and they go to the owner on the opposite sides. However, there is one owner they are dealing with and this owner brought in a petition to vacate these streets and then consolidate the land into one major parcels and a couple of smaller ones, so anyone can approach anyone to buy a piece of land, but this owner came before the Planning Commission with a plan, and the Planning Commission approved it and recommended it to City Council. S. Herron said the Ohio Revised Code provides that it's an automatic reverting. The interest in the property once a vacation occurs from the City goes to the owner. S. Marks asked if he was allowed to know what the metro parks was paying for this property. K. Stumphauzer said it should be public record once it closes. S. Marks asked if he would have to petition the owner to purchase that property once the deal is closed. J. Martynowski said if he is talking about vacating Lewis Drive, then he would have to get anybody that has property along Lewis Drive to submit a petition to vacate. J. Martynowski said they don't have to put their property up for public auction and they already have a contract with the metro parks. S. Herron redirected the hearing back to the street vacation aspect rather than discussing the purchasing of property.

Jason Jordan of 863 Howard asked if the metro parks is using the section of Dorothy, Gilbert, and Frederick that exist, is there any plans to update those roads for the additional traffic. S. Herron said that deal will be taken up with the city once a deal is made for sale and once the metro parks decides what they are going to do with the property. It would be foolish for the city to start spending money on that until they know what will be done with the property. J. Jordan said it was posted on a Facebook site where Sunrise Development was looking at this property and discussing putting in high density housing such as apartment complexes or subsidized housing. Mayor Bulan said she heard many, many years ago that Sunrise Development was looking into this. James Martynowski said he actually represents Sunrise Development and believes this post was from discussions they had 10-15 years ago. He said Sunrise Development is a partner of this property. F. Ostrander asked if the zoning will remain the same with the street vacation. If so, anybody wanting to develop this as an apartment complex would need to request a rezoning change.

Joanne Guttager of 841 Gardiner Drive thought behind them was wetlands. She asked if there was any knowledge of where the entrance of the metro parks will be. B. Holmes said he spoke directly with the Director of the Metro Parks and there are no plans at this time for any development of this parcel. So as far as entrance and parking there is nothing at this time. It's more of a conservation/preservation area. He advised the residents they could contact the Lorain County Metro Parks at 440-458-5121 or go to metroparks.cc if they had questions.

Susie Martin was curious why the metro parks weren't present at this public hearing. S. Herron said they technically aren't a party to this because they are negotiating with the property owner. The only people that need to be present are the property owner who took the plans to the Planning Commission along with the residents who were notified of the public hearing. S. Martin asked what is going to happen to the people who will lose their lots because their lots will be landlocked. J. Martynowski said they are not vacating any streets that they don't have property on both sides.

Marcie McKay of Tomahawk Lane asked if there was any kind of easement if the metro parks developed this area into a walking trail or park as they can go along the track and connect their east property to their west property. S. Herron said they were jumping the gun on this because once the sale happened and the metro parks decided to do something with the property then it would come back to the city at that time.

Mr. Dawson asked why they have been surveying the area. J. Martynowski said they are required by law to stake the property corners when they consolidate parcels.

S. Herron adjourned the public hearing and called to order the Vermilion City Council meeting.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

The members of Council, administrative staff, and audience participants recited the Pledge of Allegiance followed with a moment of silence.

PRESIDENT OF COUNCIL'S REPORT:

S. Herron extended his sympathies to the family of Matt Kobal, the football players, and staff. Matt was the head football coach for a year and had been involved in the program for a number of years and he will be missed. His death was sudden and tragic, and it's a very sad time for many in the community.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Bulan reported she had been contacted by the Mannik and Smith Group who have been working on the Abandoned Gas Station Grant and they have hired contractors. They will be at the former Fulper's site the week of December 6 – 8 to remove the impacted soil.

Secondly, Erie County has been successful again in obtaining the Community Housing Impact Preservation Program Grant (CHIP) for the county. The grant is for a total of \$1.4 million with \$450,000 going to Erie County; \$350,000 to the City of Huron and the City of Vermilion. The City of Sandusky will receive \$250,000. If anyone is interested in applying they were directed to contact the Mayor's office.

She noted Saturday, November 25th is Small Business Saturday which is a national initiative to encourage people to shop locally for Christmas. She encouraged everyone to shop downtown or local if at all possible. Anyone wishing to purchase a pool membership can pick up gift certificates which are available in the Mayor's office.

She wished everyone a safe and a Happy Thanksgiving. On behalf of the city, she offered condolences to the Matt Kobal family for their tragic loss.

SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:

T. Valerius reported the street sweeper has been out quite regularly. However, he asked the residents to not blow or rake their leaves into the street. The city does not perform leaf collecting services and the leaves can clog up the city storm sewers. However, citizens can bag their leaves in the brown paper leaf bags and set them out with their regular garbage on Wednesday's. They will collect these bags through December 13. B. Holmes asked why the city doesn't pick up leaves. T. Valerius said it is a manpower issue.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:

B. Keller reported on the progress of the capital asset program which has been one of their priorities this year. They have started the process by extracting all internal reports and matching them up with what was provided earlier this year with Industrial Appraisal. The goal is to get this off their management letter. Secondly, he noted they had a follow-up call on their Affordable Care Act issues with making sure everybody is offered health insurance and is properly accounted for. They still have some details to work out but all the information he has says they are right on track. The worst case scenario could be some severe penalties but he doesn't think the city is close to that. He said his department will be focusing on their year-end policies and procedures and getting the 2018 budget ready.

B. Brady asked if noted people are not happy campers because it adds a fee of \$3.25. B. Keller said it's a technology issue but people can pay with their credit card that doesn't cost anything. Mayor Bulan said they can put some notification on the website because you have to go into the website in order to be charged something.

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J. Forthofer asked if there has been any feedback on the usage of OhioCheckbook. B. Keller said they received a few phone calls the first week it went live but since then they haven't heard anything. He said there is a mechanism where he can see how many people viewed the website.

M. Stark said the last time the finance director reported to council it was mentioned the meeting was cancelled with Lennon and Company in regards to the bank reconciliations. She asked if this has happened yet. B. Keller said the original meeting was rescheduled to November 30. M. Stark asked how long the bank reconciliations have not been done. B. Keller said it has been about a year. M. Stark asked if he received the 2016 audit yet. B. Keller said it has been completed and he would be happy to provide council with the link.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT: No report.

LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT: No report.

OPEN TO THE AUDIENCE:

Homer Taft of Edgewater addressed two points that he wanted to make sure council and the administration as a whole were considering. First, he said there are geysers of sanitary water coming out of the manholes on Edgewater Drive which is going into the storm drains and discharging to the lake. This is not something the city wants to let continue. He didn't think the Ohio and US EPA would look well on it. Secondly, this is due to the intrusion of a lot of storm water into those sewers. He asked the administration to enforce this and for council to ensure the administration enforces the laws to not discharge storm water into sanitary systems.

J. Martynowski addressed the Resubdivision plat by stating there were a couple minor changes but they are waiting for Lorain County to review both plats. The drawings he brought in were up to date. S. Herron asked if Ordinance 2017-54 needs to be adopted tonight in conjunction with the street vacation. L. Miggins said not necessarily because the vacation plat will not go into effect until 30 days pass, so it's strictly up to council.

NEW BUSINESS:

F. Loucka MOVED; M. Stark seconded to place the third reading of Ordinance 2017-43 back on the agenda as it was tabled on November 6. Roll Call Vote 7 YEAS. **MOTION CARRIED.**

READING OF ORDINANCES:

F. Loucka MOVED; S. Herron seconded to amend the third reading of Ordinance 2017-43; Section 1 (f) to read a Special Flood Hazard Area Development Permit Fee Application of \$500.00. The Applicant shall be responsible for the cost of all review fees incurred by the City, up to a cap of \$1,000. G. Fisher questioned if the cap was for the engineering fee separate from the \$500 permit application fee. F. Loucka said no it's \$500.00 up to \$1,000. G. Fisher asked if the intent is so the engineer isn't supposed to go over \$1,000. F. Loucka said it will be capped at \$1,000 and if there is any overage the city would absorb the difference. B. Brady felt the cap goes both ways because the engineer should have a limit to what she can charge for the job and she didn't think the city should give a blank check. If it's outside that application then it's different. She thinks the cap should be on both sides where the property owner doesn't pay any more than \$1,000, and the city engineer isn't going to bill over \$1,000. F. Loucka didn't know if setting a cap on the engineer is practical if there is time involved and it's charged against the job. M. Stark said at the last meeting they heard that many communities don't charge anything for this and they had \$500 in the first amendment and now they are talking about increasing it to a \$1,000. She doesn't want it to hurt people who want to build because it could change people's minds. She doesn't want to be the community who keeps charging and taking. She felt they should cap what the engineer can charge. B. Brady said a lot of the communities have engineers as part of the administration and Vermilion's engineer is contracted, so she doesn't

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know why the contract can't be limited to a price. She said a flat fee to do the contract is fair. F. Loucka said comparison with other communities is apples to oranges because it depends on how their money is spent because it may be built into another part of the fee. He said when somebody is looking to build a house along the river this is extremely minor and it will not deter somebody to build a quality home along the river in Vermilion. Roll Call Vote 5 YEAS (Ostrander, Herron, Holmes, Loucka, Forthofer); 2 NAYS (Stark, Brady). **MOTION CARRIED.**

F. Loucka MOVED; S. Herron seconded to adopt Ordinance 2017-43 as amended and declaring an emergency. Roll Call Vote 4 YEAS (Herron, Holmes, Loucka, Forthofer), 3 NAYS (Ostrander, Stark, Brady). **MOTION CARRIED.**

J. Forthofer MOVED; F. Loucka seconded to adopt this ordinance by emergency. Roll Call Vote 7 YEAS. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Third Reading – Ordinance 2017-51: AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 440 OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF VERMILION, ENTITLED "COMMERCIAL AND HEAVY VEHICLES" AND SECTION 440.01 (b) ENTITLED "LOAD LIMITS", AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

F. Loucka MOVED; B. Holmes seconded to adopt this ordinance by emergency. Discussion: B. Brady asked if the city set permit fees. G. Fisher knows they set penalties, but wasn't sure about permit fees. T. Valerius doesn't recall a fee either. B. Brady said she was worried about people coming into town and realizing they didn't need a permit and then get fined because of it. T. Valerius said if the ordinance passes the administration will send out notifications to all local contractors. B. Brady suggested a grace period. S. Herron said there is an argument to be made that this is over legislated because there are so many exceptions; particularly in Vermilion on the Lake. B. Holmes said basically they need Chief Hartung and the officers doing more enforcement. B. Brady asked if they don't want the routes established. S. Herron said there are so many heavy vehicles that are already exempted that he doesn't know if they need a law on the books to deal with the situation. There are roads that are totally

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susceptible to this and most are in VOL, but it's a city-wide ordinance. F. Ostrander said what brought this about is the rock trucks they used in Elberta Beach and if they would have used smaller loads on those trucks then they wouldn't have had that problem. With this ordinance, at least they have something to enforce. Mayor Bulan said the administration also needs to know about it because they never got a permit, so they weren't aware that it even happened. M. Stark asked if they should have had a permit to begin with. Mayor Bulan said they should have gotten a permit from ODNR and they didn't have one. Roll Call Vote 3 YEAS (Ostrander, Loucka, Forthofer) 4 NAYS (Holmes, Brady, Stark, Herron). **MOTION FAILED.**

F. Loucka MOVED; B. Brady seconded to adopt this ordinance by emergency. Roll Call Vote 6 YEAS; 1 ABSTENTION (Holmes). **MOTION CARRIED.**
